On April 23, 2023, Delaware became the 22nd state to legalize adult-use marijuana. On May 1, 2024, the Office of the Marijuana Commissioner (OMC) published proposed rules that will govern the new industry. Public comments will be accepted until June 3, 2024, and should be directed to **OMC@delaware.gov**. This guide was created to help prospective applicants evaluate licensing opportunities and provide a first look at how marijuana will be regulated in the First State.



LICENSING CATEGORIES AND CRITERIA

LICENSE CATEGORY	APPLICANT CRITERIA	
Social Equity	Applicant must be at least 51% owned and controlled by one or more individuals who: (1) were convicted of (or are the children of someone who was convicted of) a marijuana-related offense; OR (2) resided for at least five of the past 10 years in an area with a disproportionate amount of marijuana-related arrests.	
Microbusiness	Reserved for cultivation and product manufacturing applicants who (1) must be at least 51% owned and controlled by one or more Delaware residents; (2) employ no more than 10 employees; <u>AND</u> (3) are limited to 2,500 sq. ft. of cultivation canopy or possession of less than 1,000 marijuana plants.	
Open	Applicants not subject to the above restrictions.

OWNERSHIP RESTRICTIONS

Under the proposed rules, no applicant or person with a financial interest in an application can apply for or own more than one license of the same type in the same county. This restriction does not, however, prevent an applicant from holding vertically-integrated licenses in each county. Also, this restriction does not apply to existing medical marijuana licenses converting to adult-use licenses.

APPLICATION MATERIALS AND PROCESS

- A. Minimum Qualifications. To apply for a marijuana license in Delaware, applicants must demonstrate minimum qualifications through submission of a comprehensive business plan, including a budget and pro forma financial statements; and plans for operations, training and staffing of its facility. Under the proposed rules, applicants for cultivation and product manufacturing licenses must also submit a quality assurance plan.
- B. Lottery. Upon satisfaction of OMC minimum qualifications and payment of the application fee, applicants will be entered into a lottery to be conducted in an impartial and random manner. Selected applicants will be notified within 10 days following the lottery.
- Conditional Licensing. Within 10 days of selection, successful applicants must submit a supplemental application and pay the applicable licensing fees. Applicants will then undergo comprehensive financial and criminal background checks, including fingerprinting. Upon completion, applicants will be granted a Conditional License, but may not engage in the licensed activity or transfer control or ownership of the license.
- D. Active Licensing. Applicants who receive a Conditional License have 18 months to identify a physical location for operations to be approved by the Commissioner. Only after local approval of the physical location; submission of an attestation that the Applicant has entered into a labor peace agreement (LPA) with a bona fide labor organization; and, final inspection by OMC, may an Applicant commence operations.

November 1, 2024	OMC to begin issuing up to 60 cultivation facility licenses
December 1, 2024	OMC to begin issuing up to 30 product manufacturing licenses
March 1, 2025	OMC to begin issuing up to 30 retail licenses and five testing facility licenses
